Sabrina Ragone has been "García Pelayo" Fellow at the Centro de Estudios Políticos y Constitucionales, Madrid, since February 2012.

She got her Degree in Law from the University of Bologna with a final thesis in Comparative Public Law (2004) and a postgraduate specialization in Parliamentary Law with a grant of the "Seminario di Studi e Ricerche Parlamentari Silvano Tosi", Excellence Center of the University of Florence (2005).

She attended PhD courses at the University of Pisa (Public Law Department), within the programme "Constitutional Justice and Fundamental Rights" based on an agreement with Carlos III University (Madrid) and she got her PhD with a dissertation about the Judicial Review of Constitutional amendments in comparative perspective (2009).

Afterwards she was post doctoral Fellow in Public Law at the Political Science Department of the University of Bologna (2010) and post doctoral researcher in Constitutional Law at the Political Science and Public Law Department of the Autonomous University of Barcelona (2011).

Between 2005 and 2011 she taught Comparative Public Law and Constitutional Law at the University of Bologna, the University of Jaén and the Autonomous University of Barcelona, as well as various undergraduate and postgraduate courses and Summer Schools organized by Italian, Spanish, Mexican, Moroccan and Colombian Institutions.

She was Visiting Researcher in European and Latin American Centers and she participated in regional, national and international projects related in particular to the comparative method, the role of judges, the electoral management and the territorial organization.

She authored the book *I controlli giurisdizionali sulle revisioni costituzionali. Profili teorici e comparativi*, Bononia University Press, 2011 and she has contributed many chapters in books and numerous articles in Law Reviews, about various topics related for instance to Constitutional Justice, Decentralization and Local Government, Bioethics and Protection of Rights.
